NATIONAL REGISTER CRITERIA STATEMENT (if applicable)

The Santuit Historic District possesses integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling and association. It is significant for its early prominence as the economic center of one of Barnstable's southern villages, which is reflected in its remarkably well preserved collection of fine houses from the 18th and 19th centuries. Strong associations with settlement patterns, commerce, and a notable local family, the Crockers, further fulfill criteria A, B, and C of the National Register of Historic Places.

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other areas within the community.

The Santuit Historic District, located at an important crossroads, leading to the neighboring towns of Sandwich and Mashpee/Falmouth, comprises a small yet highly refined collection of domestic architecture from the mid 18th through the mid 19th centuries. Georgian, Federal, and a single Italianate style interpretation inform these six buildings in an unusually sophisticated manner. All set close to the busy Route 28 thoroughfare on large lots (1/2 to 2+ acres), the majority of structures, unless otherwise noted, stand 2 to 2 and 1/2 stories high with gabled roofs and wood shingle siding. Both vernacular and relatively high style interpretations are represented. The descriptions following run west to east through the district.

CTA6- Alvan Crocker Homestead (c1769). This house displays a curiously asymmetrical fenestration across its four bay facade, but steadies itself with a classical center entry and chimney. Two windows to the west and one to the east flank the entry, admirably formed by pilasters and triangular pediment. Like its Georgian neighbors here, first story windows

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain historical importance of area and how the area relates to the development of other areas of the community.

The Santuit Historic District represents the core of the first settlement of the Cotuit village, an area which derived much of its historical significance from its extensive and protected coast. The inland center at Santuit served a predominantly agricultural community. The district's geographic position at the intersection of major through roads produced a community focus here as long as land travel and land based resources were in their prime. Gradually, and by the last half of the 19th century, maritime activities dominated the village so completely as to transfer the original Cotuit denomination to Cotuit Port and Cotuit Highland, contiguous areas directly on Nantucket Sound (see Cotuit Historic District, Area CTB/C). Fortunately, Santuit continues to retain memories of its earlier prosperity.

As suggested by the house names, Santuit was heavily populated by hard-working members of the Crocker family. Ebenezer Crocker Jr. moved to Santuit from West BArnstable in 1739, marking the beginning of the village of Cotuit. Farming and carpentry are known to have occupied several early residents, while various commercial and civic functions have also operated out of these buildings. The Zenas Crocker Homestead, for example, maintained a tavern in the early 19th century, while the Roland T. Crocker House at various times sheltered Cotuit's first library, a post office, and a popular tavern. The village school and Congregational Church, both now destroyed, were located just south of the district on Main Street. The original families occupied many of these buildings into the 20th century despite their waning economic base. Seasonal residents and a proliferation of shops characterize the most recent trend in Santuit, as in other parts of Barnstable.

These exterior architectural features are reinforced on the interior by some of the finest raised field panelling extant in any Crocker House, as well as by remnants of a c1751 English wallpaper.

CTA5- Ebenezer Crocker Homestead (c1739). Reputed to have been moved here by oxen c1739 as a three room half house, this house acts as an architectural centerpiece for the Santuit Historic District. The house presents a full five bays with a central chimney and entry; the latter an elaborate and robust composition of pilasters, modillioned pediment, and narrow transom above the door itself. Heavily projecting lintels top first story windows, while second story windows are framed into the cornice; all contain 6/6 sash. The interior features panelling of various dates.

 $\overline{\text{CTA4-Alvan Crocker}}$, Jr. House (c1796). Built across the street c1796, this cottage is only 1 and 1/2 stories, and was originally a three bay half house with offset entry and interior end chimney. A windowless eastward extension has recently lengthened the building significantly. Details such as its transomed entry and windows with simple surrounds and 6/6 sash are typical of the vernacular Federal period style in Barnstable.

CTA3- Zenas Crocker Homestead (c1782). The last of the Georgian houses in the Santuit Historic District lends a more substantial presence to the streetscape. Its full five bays surround a central chimney which is offset to the east, probably indicating its evolution from a half-house. The simple center entry may date from the Federal period, as it features the pilastered surround and five pane transom characteristic of that style in Barnstable. First story windows again display heavily projecting caps, and all retain 6/6 sash. Two story gabled ells at one time extended the house lengthwise in both directions, but only the eastern wing remains.

CTA1- Roland T. Crocker House (c1796). A nearly cubical plan, low hip roof, interior end chimneys, and clapboard siding dignify this house which is one of the few full blown examples of the Federal period style outside of Barnstable Village (see Area BV/WB). Its symmetrical facade contains a handsome entry with fluted pilasters, semi-circular fan and modillioned pediment. Simple moldings enframe 6/6 sash throughout. This house provides a strong anchor to the east end of the district.

CTA2- Zenas Crocker III House (c1860). Lastly and most fancifully designed is this notable local example of the Italianate style. The building consists of a 2 and 1/2 story gable end section facing the street with a one story ell set perpendicular towards the back; both sections are clapboarded. Full height windows at the first story, round arched windows with pronounced label moldings at the second story and attic, and paired brackets at the eaves further distinguish this house, and enthusiastically punctuate the architectural lineage of the Santuit Historic District.




